Beautiful Uncertainty—How to Live (and Thrive) With Risk

Whilst there is sadly no magic 8 ball to help us make the right decision, and no crystal ball to help us see the future, there are certainly ways to lessen negative effects of risk and uncertainty on our lives, and even learn to spot opportunities. These tools are not monetarily expensive but do require some time and effort. But the rewards can be wonderful. I hope to show you how uncertainty and risk can be embraced and harnessed to help build resilience and community.

Before coming to work at the David Geffen School of Drama at Yale. Anna Glover (they/them) had more than 12 years' experience working in two of the largest and most prestigious theater and arts organizations in the United Kingdom: London's Royal National Theatre (NT) and Southbank Centre.



The Flood of July 2023 at the Justin Morrill Homestead

Walking Directions & Maps

Studio Place Arts (201 N. Main Street, Barre, VT 05641) is about a **6 minute walk** from the Elks Lodge/Aldrich Library. Head south on Elm Street towards Washington Street. Take a right on Washington Street and continue onto N. Main Street for **.2 miles (3.5 blocks)**. **Studio Place Arts is a 6 minute walk from the Old Labor Hall**. When leaving the Old Labor Hall, take a right on Granite Street towards Main Street, then take a right on Main Street for about 2 blocks.

The **Aldrich Library** (6 Washington Street, Barre, VT 05641) is a **1 minute walk** from the Elks Lodge. The Jefferson Street entrance is just across the street from the Elks Lodge main entrance.

The **Vermont History Center** (60 Washington Street, Barre, VT 05641) is about a **6 minute walk** from the Elks Lodge/Aldrich Library. Head south on Elm Street towards Washington Street. Take a left on Washington Street for **.2 miles**. The Vermont History Center is about a **15 minute walk** (**.6 miles**) from the Old Labor Hall or an **8 minute walk** (**.3 miles**) from Studio Place Arts. When leaving the Old Labor Hall, take a right on Granite Street towards Main Street, then take a right on Main Street and continue onto Washington Street. From Studio Place Arts, take a left onto Main Street and continue onto Washington Street.

The Old Labor Hall (46 Granite Street, Barre, VT 05641) is about a 9 minute walk from the Elks Lodge/Aldrich Library. Head south on Elm Street towards Washington Street. Take a right on Washington Street and continue onto N. Main Street for .3 miles (5 blocks). Turn left on Granite Street for .1 miles (2.5 blocks). The Old Labor Hall is a 6 minute walk from Studio Place Arts. Take a right on Main Street for about 2 blocks and take a left onto Granite Street.
